



REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL FROM THE WORLD INITIATIVE FOR SOY IN HUMAN HEALTH (WISHH)

I. DATE

October 18, 2021

II. PROJECT OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this Request for Proposal (RFP) is to identify a contractor based in Cambodia to implement three Cambodian aquaculture projects. These projects include In-Pond Raceway (IPRS), a Snakehead feeding activities and pond aeration activities. All three are funded by either the United Soybean Board (USB) or Qualified State Soybean Board (QSSB). The contractor would work with ASA/WISHH St. Louis headquarter staff and the Commercialization of Aquaculture for Sustainable Trade (CAST) program staff in Cambodia to implement these three projects.

III. ORGANIZATION BACKGROUND

The American Soybean Association (ASA) was founded in 1920 by soybean farmers and extension workers to promote soy for high protein applications in developmental settings. Overseas activities initiated in the mid-1950s, and to date ASA has worked in over 80 countries. The World Initiative for Soy in Human Health (WISHH) was founded in 2000 to expand the work of the American Soybean Association (ASA) in developing and emerging markets to improve health, nutrition and food security, building the groundwork for future markets of soy. WISHH provides services in food technology, business development, nutrition services, and program and proposal development. WISHH expertise extends its network into additional areas, such as aquaculture and animal feed.

ASA/WISHH connects trade and development to strengthen agricultural value chains in emerging markets, creating trade and long-term demand for U.S. soy. Trade can improve lives worldwide for both farmers and consumers. U.S. soy trade in emerging markets is pivotal to improve accessibility, affordability, and acceptability of high-quality plant and animal-sourced proteins in developing economies. Rising incomes in emerging economies generate further opportunity for trade. ASA/WISHH builds opportunity for long-term trade by improving agricultural value chains, human and animal nutrition, and farmer net incomes. ASA/WISHH initiatives broadly fit in two arenas: (1) trade-building long-term, early-stage market development, and (2) trade-building international agriculture and economic development. The St. Louis-based Program operates in sub-Saharan Africa, Asia and Central America.

ASA/WISHH offers proven feed sector capacity and decades of accumulated knowledge from ASA programs. Principal approaches include market and economic assessments, technical assistance and capacity building, food and feed trials and demonstrations, farmer field days, youth mentorship programs, food and feed value chain development, and market linkages.

ASA/WISHH achieves its mission by working in close partnership with: (1) the public sector (e.g., USDA, USAID, U.S. land grant universities, and host country governments), (2) the private sector (e.g., U.S. exporters and trade associations: Qualified State Soybean Boards and U.S. Soybean Export Council), and (3) private voluntary organizations. The Program draws upon the resources and experience of these partners and the services of a cadre of ASA/WISHH consultants with technical expertise in agricultural, international and commercial development spheres. ASA/WISHH relies on decades of experience in food commercial development and agricultural development programming. The Program takes pride in its growing portfolio of success with U.S. government-funding, including USDA (Food for Progress, McGovern-Dole, Global Broad-Based Initiative, Foreign Market Development, Market Access Program, Emerging Markets Program, Agricultural Trade Program, Emerging Markets Program, and Quality Samples Program) and USAID funding in both prime and sub-recipient capacities. ASA/WISHH has also attracted both private sector and other complementary funding sources from various donors to build on and leverage core funding from Qualified State Soybean Boards.

WISHH's objective is to increase the international consumption of soy protein in the human, livestock, and aquaculture sectors in new markets and thereby create new opportunities for soybeans and providing higher economic returns to U.S. soybean producers.

IV. SCOPE OF WORK

The selected contractor would work with ASA/WISHH St. Louis headquarter staff and CAST staff to implement the three activities. The selected contractor, required to be based in Cambodia, would hire aquaculture specialists and other individuals to implement the three activities. CAST staff would suggest potential aquaculture farmers, trade team members, provided targeted technical assistance and assist in inviting Farmer Field Day attendees. Project expenses for technical consultants, equipment, travel, training materials and other approved expenses would be reimbursed on actual expenses through the submission of receipts and invoices. The selected contractor would provide quarterly reports which will be used to complete the required donor reports.

ASA/WISHH has identified input suppliers and individuals for the technical extension contractors.

Each activity would have its own timeline due to the funding source's objectives and completion deadlines. The Snakehead completion date is August 31, 2022, with the IPRS and pond aerator project competition date of September 30, 2022.

Below is each activity's summary.

IL Snakehead activity components include:

- Work with a Cambodian hatchery to conduct a Snakehead fingerling production trial aimed at reducing the dependence on imported fingerlings.
- Organize a team to travel to China/Vietnam to see Snakehead hatcheries/nurseries and aquaculture farmers.
- Organize Snakehead feeding demonstration.
- A Farmer Field Day to share the Snakehead feeding demonstration results.

Pond aeration activity components include:

- Work with CAST staff to set up two, locally built, pond aeration system demonstration locations and running species specific, soy-based feeding trials
- CAST staff will provide the technical assistance for the two farms and select the appropriate species.
- Organize Farmer Field Days with CAST staff to share the results of the pond aeration system demonstration

In-Pond Raceway Systems (IPRS) activity components include:

- Install IPRS at 45 aquaculture farms. Farmers and ASA/WISHH would enter into a costshare arrangement where the farmer would pay for all input costs and a significant portion of the IPRS cage costs. ASA/WISHH would pay for the balance of the IPRS cage cost and provide technical extension support.
- Contract with two technical extension consultants to provide support to the 45 aquaculture farmers
- Train aquaculture farmers on how to operate IPRS
- Provide technical extension support to the 45 aquaculture farmers using IPRS

VI. SELECTION CRITERIA AND CRITERIA WEIGHTS

Proposals submitted will be evaluated according to the following criteria:

Comprehensiveness	35%
Consultant skills/experience	30%
Cost	20%
Timing	15%
TOTAL	100%

Special consideration will be given to Women or Minority Owned Small Business (WMOSB) entities with SBA certifications (proof of certification must be provided at time of submission).

VII. INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

Proposals must contain at a minimum the specific criteria requested in the Request for Proposal:

- 1. A description of the bidder's capabilities and experience (Can be submitted as a CV)
- 2. A proposal that includes the following sections (five pages maximum):
 - Proposal executive summary
 - Action plan to implement the three activities
 - Proposed budget to implement the three activities (maximum budget of \$40,000; do not include technical consultants, equipment, travel, training materials and other approved expenses, which will be reimbursed on actual costs)
- 3. Checklist of additional items that must be submitted:
 - Attachment A Technical Proposal Authorization Cover Page Completed and Signed
 - 100-word executive summary of the proposal
 - Full detailed proposal
 - Proposal detailed budget
 - WMOSB Proof of Certification (if applicable)

Proposals should be submitted no later than 4:00 PM CST on November 10, 2021. To be considered for award, proposals must be submitted by e-mail to Alan F. Poock at apoock@soy.org. Mr. Poock will confirm receipt of each proposal; if receipt has not been confirmed, your proposal has not been received.

If your proposal is not authorized by signature on Attachment A Proposal Authorization Cover Page, it may not be considered and may be rejected.

Submission of Questions: All questions regarding the preparation of proposals must be submitted in writing (by e-mail) to Alan F. Poock at apoock@soy.org **no later than 4pm CDT on October 27, 2021**. All questions and responses will be available on the WISHH <u>website</u> on or shortly after October 29, 2021. No questions will be answered over the phone or in person; all questions must be in writing and sent via email.

ASA/WISHH reserves the right to negotiate and award only a portion of the requirements; to negotiate and award separate or multiple contracts for the elements covered by this RFP in any combination it may deem appropriate, at its sole discretion to add new considerations, information or requirements at any stage of the procurement process, including during negotiations with vendors; and reject proposal of any vendor that has previously failed to perform properly or in a timely manner contracts of a similar nature, or of a vendor that, in the opinion of ASA/WISHH, is not in a position, or is not sufficiently qualified, to perform the contract.

This RFP contains no contractual proposal of any kind, any proposal submitted will be regarded as a proposal by the vendor and not as an acceptance by the vendor of any proposal by ASA/WISHH. No contractual relationship will exist except pursuant to a written contract document signed by the authorized procurement official of ASA/WISHH and by the successful vendor(s) chosen by ASA/WISHH.
