
# Summary Report

## **ASA/WISHH Take Action for Global Food Security Dialogue**



December 13-14, 2023 U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis Maryland















## Introduction

The American Soybean Association's World Initiative for Soy in Human Health appreciated the opportunity to convene its second **Take Action for Global Food Security Dialogue** on December 13-14, 2023, at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. The United Soybean Board supported WISHH's unprecedented program that brought together 16 U.S. soybean growers and state soybean organization staff with 35 global food security leaders from international, regional and U.S. agencies, academia, and importantly, food companies and organizations with the capacity to manufacture or deliver nutritious foods globally. Together, these representatives held the latest insights on global food security as well as the capacity to bring the power of protein to the world's growing population, including those who live in the most challenging environments.

#### Objectives

- Build on WISHH's "Take Action for Food Security Dialogue 2021" to explore new approaches and partnerships that can use soy for global food security.
- Lead a review of the global food security situation and the status of actions, including partnerships, since WISHH convened the previous program in December 2021.
- Increase awareness of the intersection between global food security and national defense.



WISHH Chair *Roberta Simpson-Dolbeare* welcomed and challenged attendees to jointly explore actions that the participants could take together to improve global food security. The Illinois soybean grower quoted President Abraham Lincoln in saying "The best way to predict the future is to create it."

To encourage open discussions, attendees followed the Chatham House Rules. Therefore, meeting participants, and this report, share information without revealing the person who made any specific comment.

WISHH is deeply grateful to all speakers and participants. The ideas and inspiration shared at the program are valuable to chart a course of potential next steps. The conversations have only just begun!




Vice Admiral U.S. Navy (retired)

USDA Foreign Agricultural Service Associate Administrator **Brooke Jamison** described USDA's role in global food security and responded to a variety of questions from attendees.


